

## **Care & Handling Guide**

## **Caring For Your Glass Art**

Special care should be taken when handling glass art.

Make sure your hands are clean and dry to avoid the glass slipping and remove rings when handling the glass as they can scratch the surface.

To clean the glass, use warm (<u>not</u> hot) water with a tiny bit of environmentally friendly dish washing soap. Rinse and dry with a soft cotton cloth. The glass is annealed for strength but not tempered, so we recommend warm to cool water. Sudden thermal shock (like boiling water into the glass) should be avoided.

Place the piece on a stable, level surface out of the reach of small children and pets. To safely place the piece, carefully lift it with your hands on either side and place it on its base on a strong, stable level surface. Sliding the piece can scratch the base.

Should the unthinkable happen, and the piece gets broken, use the utmost care in handling any broken glass. Collect the larger pieces carefully and dispose of responsibly, as directed in your locality. Please use a vacuum cleaner with particulate filter to remove any remaining small particles and dust. Do not sweep.

Some outdoor sculptures, like the Seablooms are not frostproof. Like tender plants, please store them in a dry place until the frosts have passed. If you have any questions. Please feel free to contact me.

The packing materials used are all made from recycled or part recycled materials. We work to be as sustainable as possible in all things including as little plastic as possible, aiming for no plastic, so your packaging is recyclable. The void fill used is made from cellulose and is compostable.
